Critical Theory provides an introduction to the most relevant critical schools of the twentieth century. The seminar combines theoretical readings with an analysis of literary works of the recent past. Sometimes, cultural products are discussed in class to provide an understanding of how recent critical schools are interpreting reality. Special emphasis is dedicated to gender studies.

TEACHING RATIONALE:

A. Lectures

Lectures are taught in the regular scheduled provided by the School of Humanities. These 90-minute sessions are organised so that the syllabus is presented, visual help is generally provided. Each lectura is complemented with an analysis of texts that can be used as illustrative of the thematic units. Moreover, critical discussions and debates are highly expected at this point.

B. Workshop Sessions

Small group seminar classes are taught in the workshop sessions. The timetable for these sessions is also provided by the School of Humanities. These sessions are devoted to the analysis and critical commentaries of the proposed texts. Students' oral reports are always allocated in these sessions.

C. Autonomous learning

Studying and reading are part of students' autonomous learning. The course booklet can be downloaded from our virtual learning environment.

8. Systems and Assessment Criteria

8.1 System for Assessment:

8.2 Assessment Criteria and Marks:

8.2.1 Examinations Convocatory I

Assessment Criteria

- Assingments (70%):
 - A minimum of 5 (out of 6) short papers: Students will hand in written assignments that are discussed orally during the workshop sessions (1500 words).
 - The first short paper, on basic text analysis, is compulsory as part of the first workshop session.
- Attendance and participation (30%)
 - Attendance is compulsory to all workshop sessions. To be accountable for this 30% of the final mark, students have not only to attend but to present their critical papers to their peers during the workshop sessions. Critical discussions about the papers presented is to be expected as well.
